Why Worship Series?

Have you ever sat in church thinking, "Why do we do what we do?" If you don't know the background of "why we do what we do" it seems a bit random, doesn't it?

Maybe you've wondered, "How do the pastors figure out what they're going to preach on? Do they just close their eyes and put their finger on random pages of the Bible to determine what they'll read during the service?"

Maybe you've also noticed a slight change in worship over the last month. Each weekend's services have been part of a worship "series." During the season of Lent, we walked "The Way of the Cross." Now, during the season of Easter, we're exploring "Risen! The Ongoing Impact of the Resurrection." Where did these series come from? Why are we using them?

Many modern churches implement topical sermon series. In a topical series, worship focuses on a main topic, with a sub-theme connected to that main topic discussed each week. Fitting thematic sections of Scripture are selected for each week's worship. This is certainly a fine practice to proclaim God's Law and Gospel! In fact, this summer, we will use a couple topical sermon series here at Mount Olive. We've also done this in the past.

However, a majority of the worship series used at Mount Olive are connected to a deeper history of

the Christian church. To answer our previous hypothetical question, the three readings we use in our services each weekend aren't chosen by dart throwing or casting lots! These three lessons are specifically chosen for that specific weekend of the church year, connected because they share a common, fitting theme.

Scripture readings have been an important aspect of worship all the way back to the Jewish synagogue, where a lesson from the law, and a lesson from the prophets was read in each service. If you read Luke 4:16-30, Jesus reads what was probably the appointed lesson from the Prophets for that day from the prophet Isaiah, in his hometown synagogue of Nazareth.

Throughout the history of the Christian church, subtle changes have occurred, but the focus on proclaiming a variety of Scripture in worship remained. Second century Christians added readings from the New Testament gospels epistles. Fourth and century Christians in Svria included two lessons from the Old Testament and two from the New Testament. By the end of the 5th century, lectionaries (a book or listing that contains collection а of scripture readings appointed for worship on a given day or provided occasion) three readings—one from the Old Testament, one from the Gospels, and one from the other New Testament books.

As confessional Lutherans immigrated to America in the late 1800s, an interest in preserving the historic appointed readings came with. With the publication of The Lutheran Hymnal in 1941, a majority of Wisconsin Synod churches began to read the historic lessons in worship.

On p. 163-165 in the red Christian Worship hymnal, you'll find a three-year lectionary of appointed readings for each specific Sunday. 2008. the blue Christian In Supplement Worship added supplementary options for the first lessons. and second These supplementary readings are intended to better fit the thematic focus of the historic gospel lessons. At Mount Olive, we use these historic lectionaries to select the Scripture readings for each weekend.

The church fathers who compiled these lectionaries often grouped the appointed readings together thematically, allowing each weekend generally to have a common traceable theme. The weekends during a portion of the vear are often church also connected by a main theme. This allows a pastor to simply figure out the common theme of each weekend and how it fits into the season of the church year. Then, we can bring out the common themes by turning it into a worship series.

Worship series certainly aren't condemned or commanded.

However, the main focus of a weekend or a season of the church year can become more evident and visible when connected to a series and theme. Otherwise, many might not even realize the connections of "why we do what we do" from week to week.

Since "God is not a God of disorder but of peace" (1 Cor. 14:33), we want our worship of him to be as orderly and accessible as possible. Helping everyone see the common thread woven through the readings, hymns, and liturgy for the weekend by turning it into a series, can help us do that.

If you'd like to prepare your mind and heart for the common theme for each Sunday, I'd invite you to look up the appointed readings, listed in the front of Christian Worship (mentioned earlier) and read them during the week ahead of worship. Another great resource is weekly WELS worship helps posted each week at the following website: wels.net/ serving-you/devotions/worshiphelps/

It's my prayer that these worship series will better help you understand the intricate beauty and connection of God's Word, as well as the wonderful connection we share to the historic practices of the Christian church from the very beginning.

Establishment of WLC Congregational Matching Grant Program


Mount Olive's Church Council, at their March meeting, approved the establishment of the WLC Congregational Matching Grant Program. Wisconsin Lutheran College (WLC) is a liberal arts college affiliated with the WELS and is committed to providing quality teaching, scholarship, and service that are rooted in Holy Scripture; promoting the spiritual growth of students and preparing students for lives of Christian leadership. WLC now offers a Congregational Matching Grant program so that churches can encourage and support students who want to attend WLC. WLC will provide a dollar for dollar match, up to \$1000, for any congregational grants given to full-time, undergraduate students. Each year, a number of Mount Olive students are enrolled at WLC.

The Church Council approved the creation of a WLC Matching Grant Fund with the stipulation that the Mount Olive Scholarship Committee must approve all distributions from the WLC Matching Grant Fund. Based on federal and state tax regulations, donations to the Fund cannot be directed to any specific student, but must be awarded equally among qualified students from the congregation. The actual amount of the yearly grant is the same for every student who submits an application by April 1st for the upcoming school year.

Several Mount Olive families made contributions to the WLC Matching Grant Fund to establish the fund, and Mount Olive has awarded grants to Grace Flatau, Mary Kolell, and Addie Slominsky.

As the WLC Matching Grant Fund is a restricted fund, the Fund does not receive support from Mount Olive's operational budget. The WLC Matching Grant Fund is dependent only on direct contributions. If you would like to contribute to the WLC Matching Grant Fund, simply indicate your gift on any blue envelope.

We even had the opportunity to share our faith with kids outside the church, kids from the local community that had come out of interest in playing soccer. God willing, maybe these kids will go to more events at St. John's in the future, and they can learn more about their Savior and come to faith!

Without the funds I received from Mount Olive, this trip would not have been as much of a success. I would have been more focused on coming up with the money for this trip than sharing my faith and creating great memories with the kids in Antigua. I will never forget my time with those amazing people, and I hope that opportunities like this will be more available in the future. New Workers in Manilla



After returning from his visit to our mission partner, Law and Gospel Lutheran Church in Manila, Pastor Raasch described its pastor, Rev. Alvien DeGuzman, as a "man of many hats." As the only pastor of this small church with worship sites in three separate communities, Pastor DeGuzman is "stretched thin" in his

service to the growing number of souls God is bringing to him.

But God is also bringing helpers! Men who have previous theological training in the Lutheran Church of the Philippines! Three men who have left that church in search of a confessional Lutheran church faithful to God's Word in Scripture.

With joy in your heart, please meet Deacon Filmore Alvarez. Deacon Alvarez completed two years at the Lutheran seminary. Disturbed by a lack of clarity and sound doctrinal teaching, he contacted Pastor DeGuzman and has studied and accepts Law and Gospel's solid scriptural beliefs.

Presently, Mr. Alvarez is serving as a deacon of the part of Law and Gospel congregation meeting in Novatas City, a group of about 30 souls. He assists in Bible study teaching, catechism, and as liturgist. He is comfortable with social media and has potential to use Facebook and other social media for outreach. Our Pastoral Studies Institute, a teaching ministry of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary in Mequon, is working with Deacon Alvarez to continue and complete his pastoral training while he serves in Novatas City.

We thank God that he is supplying workers to this infant church in Manila. You will meet the other two men in future editions of the *Messenger*. Truly, God is able to do more than we can think or imagine! Thank you for keeping this work in your prayers and being part of it!



The work and goals of Mount Olive SISTERS are guided by, and can be summed up in, the words of Hebrews 10:24, 25

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

Every summer, Mount Olive SISTERS likes to encourage having personal devotions using new devotional books. This year, we are focusing on the book, <u>On Giving Advice To God</u> (two books). 
Annual SISTERS in Christ Retreat from 8 a.m.-noon with fellowship and lunch to follow.

April 2018

General Fund revenues for the month ending March 31, 2018, were \$21,565 lower than budget. Year-to-date offerings are \$24,704 lower than budget. Tuition is \$2,556 higher than budget. Other income is \$17,228 higher than budget.

General Fund expenses for the month of March are were \$11,364 lower than budget. Year-to-date expenses for the period ending March 31, 2018, were \$44,042 lower than budget.
